Founded in 1895, Eastern Illinois University (EIU) is in its second century of service. The campus is located in Charleston, 180 miles south of Chicago, 140 miles northeast of St. Louis, and 9 miles east of I-57. The Coles County Airport is nearby, and Amtrak has daily train service to this area.

Colleges within the university include: Business and Applied Sciences; Sciences; Education and Professional Studies; and Arts and Humanities.

The Honors Program is available to students who meet the following criteria: (1) ACT composite of 26 or above, and (2) rank in the upper 10 percent of their high school graduating class. Participants in the Honors Program may receive limited one-time as well as renewable scholarships. Talented Student Awards are also given in fine arts, athletics, and journalism.

Governors State University (GSU) offers majors and courses to juniors, seniors, and graduate level students only. It is the only public upper-division university in Illinois founded to serve the needs of community college graduates, transfer students, and other returning adult and commuting students who have the equivalent of two or more years of college. High school students who are considering attending a community college can follow a "2-step" approach to earning a bachelor's degree by (1) obtaining an associate's degree or completing 60 semester or 90 quarter hours at their local community college and then (2) transferring to GSU to obtain a bachelor's degree. GSU and several community colleges in Illinois have developed articulation agreements and transfer guides that enable students to make a smooth transfer and transition from the community colleges to upper-division majors at GSU. GSU offers 21 undergraduate majors, 12 concentrations, and 17 minors in the liberal arts, sciences, education, business, health professions.

## Admissions Requirements

### Freshmen

As GSU enrolls only juniors, seniors, and graduate students, it is inappropriate for GSU to establish minimum high school course requirements for baccalaureate program admission as established by the Illinois Board of Higher Education.

### Transfers

A minimum of 60 semester or 90 quarter hours with a minimum GPA of 2.0 or an AA or AS degree from a regionally accredited institution and good standing at the last institution attended are required. Students not meeting the above criteria may petition for admission under certain circumstances. Specific majors have established selective criteria above the university minimum. Refer to the Governors State University Catalog for specific major criteria.

Applications are accepted up to one year in advance of the expected term of enrollment (fall, winter, and spring/summer). Specific program deadline dates are posted on the GSU website at: [www.govst.edu](http://www.govst.edu)

## Admission Requirements

Illinois State seeks a highly-motivated, academically well-prepared, and diverse student body. Priority consideration for admission will be given to outstanding students whose applications are complete and post-marked during the priority filing period for the term for which they are applying. Applications postmarked during the priority period may have an advantage when space is limited. Please refer to the 2003-2004 Undergraduate Application for Admission for more information.

## Freshman Admission Standards

### 1. College Preparation

You are encouraged to pursue as rigorous and challenging a college preparatory program as is available at your high school. You must show successful completion of:

- Four years of English with emphasis on written and oral communication and literature
- Three years of college preparatory mathematics, including algebra I, geometry and algebra II – trigonometry, or higher
- Two years of social studies with emphasis on history and government.
- Two years of laboratory science selected primarily from biology, chemistry, physics, and geology.
- Two years of one foreign language, or two years of fine arts selected primarily from art, music, and theatre.
- Two years of electives, including courses in any two of the categories above (excluding English), and/or courses in vocational education and fundamentals of computing.

### 2. Guide to Standardized Test Scores, Class Rank and Grade Point Average

- In making admissions decisions, Illinois State considers your ACT/SAT scores, high school transcript (including grade trends and rigor of courses completed), high school class rank, grade point average, your personal statement, and in some cases, letters of recommendation.
- Of those freshman students admitted for the 2002-2003 academic year, 91% ranked in the top half of their graduating class; 48% ranked in the top quarter; and 17% ranked in the top 10% of their class. The average ACT score was nearly 24 and there were significant increases over previous years in the number of admitted students having scores between 24 and 35.

### 3. Personal Statement

Illinois State believes that student motivation and academic preparation are not fully revealed by a student's high school transcript(s) or standardized test scores. The ability to succeed at Illinois State may be indicated by factors which can only be explained in written personal statements.

- Illinois State's admissions process requires the submission of a personal statement, which will be reviewed along with other documentation submitted.
- Your personal statement may be used to comment on your motivation for college-level work or to explain circumstances that may affect our admission decision and that are not readily apparent from academic records. This is your opportunity to address the Admissions Committee directly—to let the committee know more about you as an individual in a way that statistics cannot.

## Transfer Admission Standards

Highest admission priority will be granted to transfer students with the strongest academic records and those who have achieved an Associate in Arts or Associate in Science (A.A. or A.S.) degree from any regionally accredited post secondary institution. Of those transfer students admitted for the 2002-2003 academic year, the average grade point average was 2.98.

As a transfer student, you will be considered for admission if you have

- Earned a minimum overall grade point average of 2.0 on a 4.0 scale for all college work completed
- Earned good-standing status at the last college or university attended
- Met beginning freshman requirements for the term for which you are applying, or completed 30 or more semester hours of college work at the time of application to Illinois State.

Please note, an associate degree does not guarantee admission and it may not be possible to offer admission to all qualified applicants.

If you have completed an A.A. or A.S. from any regionally accredited post secondary institution or the Illinois Transferable General Education Core Curriculum at an accredited, participating Illinois college or university, you will be considered to have met the Illinois State University General Education requirements. Students completing an A.A. or an A.S. will also have junior class standing.

Transfer students who transfer credit from participating Illinois colleges or universities that satisfies some but not all requirements of the Illinois Transferable General Education Core Curriculum may satisfy Illinois State General Education requirements by completing requirements for the Transferable Core Curriculum at Illinois State or by completing the University's own General Education program. Other students must complete Illinois State's General Education program.

High school subject pattern requirements (15 academic units total): English, 4 units (emphasizing written and oral communication); Math, 3 units (college preparatory); Lab Science, 3 units (physical or biological Lab sciences); Social Sciences, 3 units (one of which must be U.S. History); Humanities, 2 units (art, film, foreign language, music or theatre). Three years of the required 15 units may be distributed by deducting no more than one unit from the categories of social science, mathematics, sciences, and humanities and completing those 3 units in any 5 categories of coursework.

Recommended high school subject pattern requirements: 4 years of English; 3 years of mathematics; 3 years of laboratory science; 3 years of social studies; and 2 years of electives.

**Transfers:** With 26 semester hours or more, students must have a 2.0 or better (4.0 scale) as calculated by SIUC for all college work and must be in good standing at last college attended. Students who have completed less than 26 semester hours, must also submit high school transcript and ACT scores and meet freshmen admission requirements in addition to transfer requirements.

## Admission Requirements

### Freshmen

**Traditional Freshman Admission Standards:** high school GPA of 2.5 on a 4 point scale and ACT (or SAT equivalent) score of 21, OR, the *sum* of the national percentile of the student's composite ACT (or SAT equivalent) and the percentile of the high school rank must equal 100 or greater.

**Special Admission:** Those who do not meet the requirements above **may** be considered if they have an ACT composite score of at least 17 (or SAT equivalent) and rank in the upper two-thirds of their high school graduating class **or** in the upper half of their graduating class with an ACT score of at least 15. Files are subject to additional review.

All first-time freshmen seeking admission to the University are recommended to complete the following high school course requirements: 4 years of English; 3 years of mathematics; 3 years of laboratory science; 3 years of social studies; and 2 years of electives. Applicants who do not meet minimum high school course requirements are required to correct high school course deficiencies as determined by the admissions office.

### Deadline for Freshman Admission

Applications are accepted after completion of the junior year; the Fall Term file completion deadline is May 31. Applications received after the deadline will be considered, based on space availability.

### Transfers

A "C" average for all previous baccalaureate-oriented college work is required. Conditional admission may be possible for students with less than a "C" average. Students who have satisfied the Illinois Articulation Initiative (IAI) General Education Core Curriculum, or who hold Associate of Arts, Associate of Science, or Associate of Arts and Science degrees from an accredited two-year institution in Illinois which conforms to the Illinois Community College Board AA, AS, or ASA models may be considered to have met general education requirements except for the Interdisciplinary course requirement. Transfers with fewer than 16 semester hours must meet freshman admission requirements.

Applications are accepted one year in advance of desired entry date; the file completion deadline is three weeks prior to the beginning of the term.

## Admission Requirements

### Freshmen

Applicants must be at least 16 years of age, be a graduate of an accredited high school or submit satisfactory scores on the GED (250 minimum), and present a satisfactory combination of class rank and ACT or SAT scores plus acceptable high school course pattern. Minimum composite ACT scores combined with high school class rank are as follows: 16 with 81st percentile or above; 22 with 49th percentile or above; or 26 with 30th percentile or above; higher in Architecture and the Arts, Business, Engineering and Kinesiology. Applicants below the 30th percentile are not eligible for admission. In 2001-2002 the ACT scores of the middle 50 percent of the entering class ranged from 20-24. The average high school percentile rank was 78 percent.

In addition, freshmen must fulfill one of two high school course pattern requirements. **Pattern 1** will admit a student to Liberal Arts and Sciences; Art & Design; Kinesiology; Art History and Performing Arts. **Pattern 2** is required for admission to Architecture, Business, Engineering, and Exercise Physiology.

### Transfers

Admission is based on hours earned and grade point average and varies by UIC college. Minimum standards are 24 semester hours of transferable credit and a cumulative grade point average of C+ (2.25/4.0). Transcripts are evaluated on a course-by-course basis. Specific transfer guides are available for most programs.

### Recommended Deadlines

Freshman applicants should apply early in the senior year and no later than February 28 for fullest consideration. Transfer applicants should apply by February 28 for fall admission and October 15 for Spring admission.

The University of Illinois at Springfield, one of three campuses of the University of Illinois, marked its 30th anniversary in 2000. Today, the more than 4,000 students enrolled are a mix of traditional residential students and full- and part-time non-traditional students – those who have transferred to UIS from other institutions; returned to finish a degree; or who are seeking advanced degrees, second degrees, or professional programs. In October 1999, UIS reached a milestone in its history when the Illinois Board of Higher Education unanimously approved the campus' four-year baccalaureate program, Capital Scholars. ACT composite score of 22 or higher (SAT 1010) and a 2.2 gpa (4.0=A) or ACT composite of 18 or higher (SAT 850) and rank in the upper 40% of high school graduating class and a 2.2 gpa (4.0=A).

### Alternative admission:

Applicants who do not meet regular admission standards may be reviewed for alternative admission. In order to be considered for alternative admission, students must have at least:

ACT composite of 16 or higher (SAT 750) and a high school cumulative grade point average of at least 2.2 (4.0 = A). Applicants should submit a letter of appeal and two letters of recommendation.

### High School Subject Pattern Requirements:

English, 4 units; social studies, 3 units; math, 3 units; science, 3 units; electives, 2 units including courses in art, foreign language, music, speech, journalism, film, religion, philosophy, theater, vocational education.

Deadline for freshman admission: consult the university.

### Transfer

- Transfer students who have earned 24 or more semester hours (36 quarter hours) of college work must have at least a "C" average for all hours attempted and be in good standing at the last college attended.
- Transfer students who have earned fewer than 24 semester hours must meet freshman admission standards, have at least a "C" average for all hours attempted, and be in good standing at the last college attended.

Students with an Associate of Arts (A.A.), Associate of Science (A.S.), or an Associate of Science and Arts (A.S.A.) verified on their transcripts from an accredited Illinois two-year institution (and selected other colleges) will have junior standing and will have met the University general education requirements.

Students with the Illinois Articulation Initiative (IAI) General Education Core Curriculum (GECC) verified on their transcripts from any participating college or university in Illinois will have met the University general education requirements.

Students who do not have the IAI GECC or associates degree verified on their transcripts may complete (1) the 37 s.h. IAI GECC, plus an additional (6) hours from any approved IAI or WIU general education course or (2) the 43 s.h. WIU general education curriculum.
